HIGHER EDUCATION EMERGENCY RELIEF FUNDS GRANT

HEERF REPORTING ON EMERGENCY FINANCIAL AID GRANTS TO STUDENTS

January 10, 2021

On March 27, 2020 the Federal Government enacted the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES ACT) Pub. L. No. 116-136 providing funds to institutions from the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund(HEERF) to make Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students for expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to the coronavirus, including eligible expenses under a student's cost of attendance, such as food, course materials, technology, health care and child care. The law requires institutions to report information related to the use of these funds.

The following information is reported for the period of October1, 2020 to December31, 2020:

- i. This report shall serve to acknowledge that Westchester School for Dental Assistants, LLC signed and returned to the U.S.Department of Education the Certification and Agreement-Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students. We attest that our institution intends to use 100% of the Grant P425E202439 received under Section 18004(a) (1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.
- ii. The total amount of funds that Westchester School for Dental Assistants, LLC has received from the Department of Education pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students is \$69841.00.
- iii. The total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants disbursed to students under Section 18004(a0(1) of the Cares Act as of October 30, 2020 is \$5110.00.
- iv. The estimated number of students at our institution that is eligible to participate in programs under 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act is 105.
- v. The total number of students who have and/or will receive an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under Section18004 (a) (1) of the CARES Act to date is **11**.
